

Anglo-Saxon City Trail

This trail starts at the **Town Hall**, where the new Museum of Oxford will be opening in 2021. It takes you to **Oxford Castle**, finishing at **St Michael's Church** in the city centre. Allow approximately an hour for the full trail.

1 Town Hall



Find a sign showing the name of this street and write it here:

You are standing on one of the oldest roads in Oxford. The Anglo-Saxons built and named the city in the late 600s.



Find a picture of an Ox and the river (ford) that gave the city its name

NEXT Walk down **St Aldates** with the Town Hall on your left. Take first right down **Pembroke St**. You will see **St Ebbe's Church** in front of you at the end of the road.

2 St Ebbe's Church



Can you find the animals on this doorway?



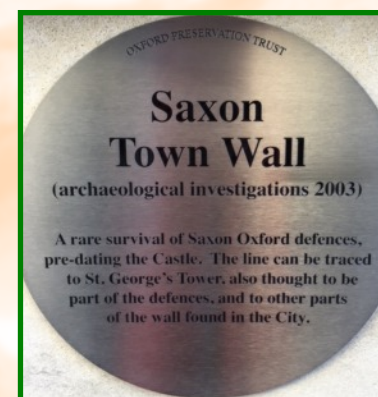
St Ebbe's dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, but hardly any of the oldest parts survive. This door was built just after the Normans invaded in 1066 and fought against the Saxons.

NEXT Go past **Sainsbury's** into the **Westgate Centre**. Go down the steps to the right of **UNIQLO**. Cross the road and go down the passage next to the **Swan and Castle** pub to enter the castle grounds. Cross the courtyard and turn left down ramp. [To avoid the steps turn right, exit the Westgate, turn left and left again]

3 Saxon Wall, castle grounds

NEXT Follow the ramp down to the right.

4 St George's Tower



We think this tower is older than the rest of the Norman built castle, and was linked to the Anglo Saxon wall that defended the town.

Can you see the doorway half way up the tower that Empress Mathilda used to escape from King Stephen, and cross the frozen river?

NEXT Turn right to follow signs to the Castle Yard.

NEXT Head out of the Castle Quarter, past the Mound to New Rd. Turn right and carry on past Bonn Square to Queen Street. Turn left at Carfax tower to go down Cornmarket. The Saxon tower of **St Michael's** will be on your right by Ship Street
