Portland Museum used the archaeological finds from the 'Earl of Abergavenny' shipwreck to train volunteers in digital recording techniques and create a publicly accessible digital archive.

Additionally, more than 150 children engaged through school visits and activities.

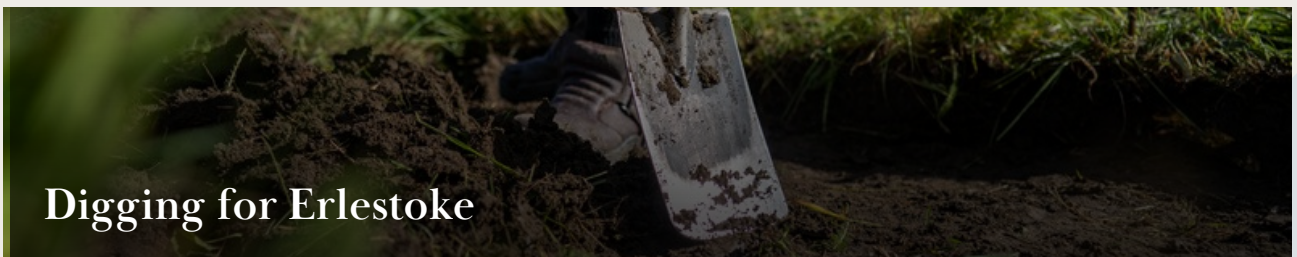

Roedd y prosiect hwn yn enghraifft wych o gynnwys y gymuned, gyda thros 100 o oedolion yn cymryd rhan yn y gwaith cloddio a diwrnod agored yn denu dros 200 o ymwelwyr. Yn ogystal, bu dros 150 o blant yn ymwneud â'r prosiect drwy ymweliadau a gweithgareddau i ysgolion.



The Pendinas Hillfort Community Archaeology Project

The Pendinas Hillfort Project was created in response to the desire of members of the Penparcau community to learn more about their hillfort, a prominent landmark in the village, to encourage more visitors to discover its archaeology and wildlife, and to see the monument better maintained.

Cafodd Prosiect Bryngaer Pendinas ei greu o ganlyniad i awydd ymhlith aelodau cymuned Penparcau i ddysgu mwy am eu bryngaer, sy'n dirnod amlwg yn y pentref, annog rhagor o ymwelwyr i ddarganfod ei harchaeoleg a'i bywyd gwyllt, a sicrhau bod yr heneb yn cael ei chynnal a'i chadw'n well.



Digging for Erlestoke

In 1963 a small-scale archaeological excavation took place on the site of HMP Erlestoke in Wiltshire when it was a different institution. During this dig items were found dating back to the Bronze Age. Sixty years on, a team from Wessex Archaeology collaborated with the prison to undertake an archaeological project with a difference. Designed to explore the impact of archaeology and heritage on the well-being of the men from the category C HMP Erlestoke prison. The men were given agency to contribute to every step of the archaeology programme.

Yn 1963, cynhaliwyd cloddfa archaeolegol ar raddfa fach ar safle HMP Erlestoke yn Wiltshire pan oedd yn sefydliad gwahanol. Yn ystod y gloddfa hon, canfuwyd eitemau oedd yn dyddio'n ôl i'r Oes Efydd. Chwe deg mlynedd yn ddiweddarach, bu tîm o Wessex Archaeology yn cydweithio â'r carchar i gynnal prosiect archaeolegol ychydig yn wahanol. Y bwriad oedd ymchwilio i effaith archaeoleg a threftadaeth ar lesiant y dynion o garchar categori C HMP Erlestoke. Galluogwyd y dynion i gyfrannu at bob cam o'r rhaglen archaeolegol.

JustALittleRoo

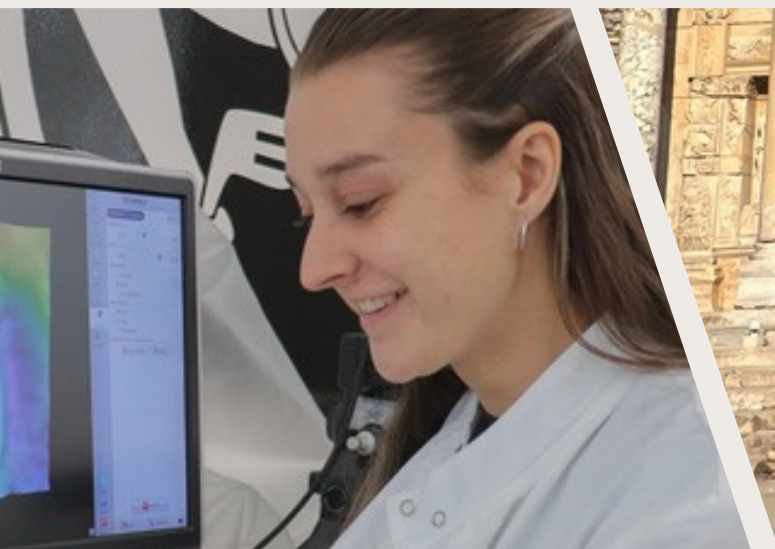

Since 2016, JustALittleRoo has provided free, internationally available careers resources, research tips, insider-views of archaeology and mini-lectures on archaeological topics.

Star Carr: Life after the Ice

An accessible and sensory exhibition on the site of Star Carr was co-curated in order to tell the story of what life was like for people living at this important Mesolithic site. This has been accompanied by activities including the building of a Mesolithic house in the museum gardens.

Must Farm Pile-Dwelling Settlement

The Late Bronze Age pile-dwelling settlement at Must Farm is one of the most important and best-preserved prehistoric sites to have been systematically excavated in Europe. This comprehensive and methodologically innovative investigation provides unprecedented insights into daily life and domestic practice in Bronze Age society.

Mae'r annedd ar byst o'r Oes Efydd Ddiweddar yn Must Farm yn un o'r safleoedd cynhanesyddol pwysicaf ac yn un o'r goreuon o ran ei gyflwr sydd wedi'u cloddio'n systematig yn Ewrop. Mae'r ymchwiliad trylwyr ac arloesol o ran ei ddulliau yn darparu cipolwg na chafwyd ei debyg o'r blaen ar fywyd pob dydd ac arferion y cartref mewn cymdeithas yn yr Oes Efydd.



Kilmartin Museum's New Permanent Exhibitions

Following a £7.8M redevelopment, Kilmartin Museum's new Permanent Exhibition offers visitors of all ages a fascinating and engaging insight into the lives of people who inhabited one of Scotland's most significant archaeological landscapes across 12,000 years. Showcasing a Nationally Significant collection, it features artefacts from Kilmartin Glen and across Argyll.

Wedi ailddatblygiad £7.8M, mae Arddangosfa Barhaol newydd Amgueddfa Kilmartin yn cynnig cipolwg hynod ddiddorol ac apelgar ar fywydau pobl fu'n byw ar un o dirweddau archaeolegol mwyaf arwyddocaol yr Alban dros 12,000 o flynyddoedd. Mae casgliad sydd o Arwyddocâd Cenedlaethol i'w weld yma, ac mae'n cynnwys arteffactau o Kilmartin Glen a phob rhan o Argyll.



A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon Road Improvement Scheme

The A14 scheme is amongst the largest archaeological investigations ever undertaken in the UK. The work covered 232ha and revealed spectacular results, from Pleistocene woolly mammoths to a deserted medieval village. The ambitious post-excavation programme resulted in over 220 outputs aimed at diverse audiences, while the community outreach programme has reached a potential audience of millions.

Mae cynllun yr A14 yn un o'r ymchwiliadau archaeolegol mwyaf i gael ei gynnal erioed yn y Deyrnas Unedig. Bu'r gwaith yn cwmpasu 232ha a datgelodd ganlyniadau rhyfeddol, o famothiaid blewog y Pleistosen i bentref a adawyd yn wag yn y canoloesoedd. Deilliodd dros 220 o ganlyniadau o'r rhaglen uchelgeisiol a ddilynodd y gwaith cloddio, ac mae'r rhaglen allgymorth gymunedol wedi cyrraedd cynulleidfâ a allai gynnwys miliynau o bobl.

Kids Dig York, York Archaeology

Kids Dig York is a project aimed at children aged 8-12, led by professional archaeologists from York Archaeology. During each 3-hour session, children, accompanied by parents/guardians, get hands-on experience of real archaeological fieldwork in a trench at Willow House, just within the City Walls near Walmgate Bar.

Junior Archaeologist Excavation Experience

Over 70 students from Long Melford Church of England Primary School started the new academic year gaining hands-on involvement with an archaeological dig in the school grounds. This unique excavation experience has been organised by members of the Long Melford Heritage Trust Archaeological Team who prepared the site – on the school's playing field – over the summer.

Irchester Field School

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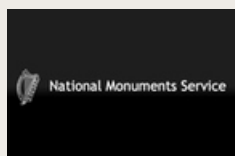
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ROYAL COMMISSION ON THE ANCIENT AND HISTORICAL MONUMENTS OF WALES

Established in 1908, the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Wales was set up to create an inventory of the most significant buildings and archaeological monuments in Wales and to work for their understanding, enjoyment and protection. Since then, the Royal Commission has maintained a leading role in researching and explaining the historic landscape, maritime and built heritage of Wales.

The survey work of the Commission is fundamental to its Royal Warrant and involves systematic pan-Wales field surveys and aerial reconnaissance, using advanced digital methods to create records that are used to enhance The National Monuments Record of Wales, the Commission's unique collection of photographs, maps, surveys and reports. The Commission has digitised large parts of its archives and made them available online through Coflein, including thousands of unique images, coflein.gov.uk. These records, and the expert advice that staff bring to their interpretation, provide the evidence base that underpins policy decisions and decision-making about the management of the historic landscape of Wales, and are much in demand by planners, researchers, teachers, publishers and the public.

Collaborative projects with other heritage organisations expand the reach and scope of our survey work. CHERISH (The Climate, Heritage, and Environments of Reefs, Islands, and Headlands project, 2017– 2023, funded by the European Union) provides a good example. This initiative with Welsh and Irish partners focused on assessing and monitoring the impacts of climate change on coastal and maritime heritage sites and establishing methodologies for future monitoring and adaptation. Many of the Commission's surveys are available on sketchfab.com/CBHC_RCAHMW, providing detailed digital replicas that can be explored and analysed by everyone.

The Commission's architectural studies are well known. Its flagship book, *Houses of the Welsh Countryside*, will be celebrating its 50th anniversary next year and is still essential reading. Current architectural projects include recording the built heritage of the 20th century, with schools and places of worship as a key building type. Recent publications include *Painted Temples: Wallpaintings and Rood-screens in Welsh Churches* (2021) and *The Swansea Canal and its Early Railways* (2023).

The Commission's historic mapping and place-names projects provide an overview of the historic landscapes of Wales. The recently launched *Historical Boundaries of Wales* website (historical-boundaries-of-wales-rcahmw.hub.arcgis.com/) maps significant historical administrative boundaries as accurately as possible to modern mapping and contains a series of publicly accessible interactive web maps (both 2D & 3D). The Commission curates the List of Historic Place Names in Wales on behalf of Welsh Government. This groundbreaking database contains over 700,000 place names collected from historical sources, providing a unique resource for the study of land-use, archaeology and history and for naming new streets, estates and developments (historicplacenames.rcahmw.gov.uk/)

The Commission plays an important role in promoting heritage through publications, exhibitions and community archaeology. Recent projects include the Pendinas Hillfort Community Archaeology Project and the Welsh Asian Heritage Project. Cafodd Comisiwn Brenhinol Henebion Cymru ei sefydlu yn 1908 er mwyn creu rhestr o'r adeiladau a'r henebion archaeolegol pwysigaf yng Nghymru a gweithio i hybu dealltwriaeth a mwynhad ohonynt ac i'w gwarchod. Ers

hynny, mae'r Comisiwn Brenhinol wedi parhau i chwarae rôl flaenllaw yn y gwaith o ymchwilio i dirwedd hanesyddol a threftadaeth arforol ac adeiledig Cymru a'u hesbonio.

Mae gwaith arolygu'r Comisiwn yn hanfodol i'w Warant Frenhinol ac mae'n cynnwys cynnal arolygon systematig yn y maes ledled Cymru a theithiau archwilio o'r awyr, gan ddefnyddio dulliau digidol datblygedig i greu cofnodion a ddefnyddir i gyfoethogi Cofnod Henebion Cenedlaethol Cymru, sef casgliad unigryw'r Comisiwn o ffotograffau, mapiau, arolygon ac adroddiadau. Mae'r Comisiwn wedi digido rhannau helaeth o'i archifau ac wedi sicrhau eu bod ar gael ar-lein drwy Coflein, ac maent yn cynnwys miloedd o ddelweddau unigryw. coflein.gov.uk.

Mae'r cofnodion hyn a'r cyngor arbenigol y mae'r staff yn ei gynnig wrth eu dehongli yn darparu'r sylfaen dystiolaeth sy'n ategu penderfyniadau polisi a phenderfyniadau ynghylch sut y caiff tirwedd hanesyddol Cymru ei rheoli, ac mae galw mawr amdanynt gan gynllunwyr, ymchwilyr, athrawon, cyhoeddwr ac aelodau'r cyhoedd.

Mae prosiectau cydweithredol gyda sefydliadau eraill ym maes treftadaeth yn ehangu cynulleidfa a chwmpas ein gwaith arolygu. Mae CHERISH (y prosiect Hinsawdd, Treftadaeth ac Amgylcheddau Riffiau, Ynysoedd a Phentiroedd, 2017– 2023, a ariannwyd gan yr Undeb Ewropeaidd) yn enghraifft dda. Bu'r fenter hon gyda phartneriaid yng Nghymru ac Iwerddon yn canolbwyntio ar asesu a monitro effeithiau newid hinsawdd ar safleoedd treftadaeth arfordirol ac arforol ac yn sefydlu methodolegau ar gyfer monitro ac addasu yn y dyfodol. Mae llawer o arolygon y Comisiwn ar gael ar sketchfab.com/CBHC_RCAHMW, sy'n darparu atgynrychiadau digidol manwl y gall pawb eu harchwilio a'u dadansoddi.

Mae astudiaethau pensaernïol y Comisiwn yn enwog. Bydd ei lyfr blaenllaw, Houses of the Welsh Countryside, yn dathlu ei ben-blwydd yn 50 oed y flwyddyn nesaf ac mae'n dal yn llyfr hanfodol i'w ddarllen. Mae prosiectau pensaernïol cyfredol yn cynnwys cofnodi treftadaeth adeiledig yr 20fed ganrif, gydag ysgolion ac addoldai'n fathau allweddol o adeiladau. Ymhlith cyhoeddiadau diweddar y Comisiwn y mae Tmlau Peintiedig: Murluniau a Chroglenni yn Eglwysi Cymru (2021) a The Swansea Canal and its Early Railways (2023).

Mae prosiectau'r Comisiwn ym maes mapiau hanesyddol ac enwau lleoedd yn darparu trosolwg o dirweddau hanesyddol Cymru. Mae'r wefan a lansiwyd yn ddiweddar, sef Ffiniau Hanesyddol Cymru (ffiniau-hanesyddol-cymru-rcahmw.hub.arcgis.com/), yn mapio ffiniau gweinyddol hanesyddol pwysig mor gywir ag sy'n bosibl ar sail mapiau modern ac mae'n cynnwys cyfres o fapiau gwe rhyngweithiol y gall y cyhoedd gael mynediad iddynt (rhai 2D a 3D). Mae'r Comisiwn yn curadu'r Rhestr o Enwau Lleoedd Hanesyddol yng Nghymru ar ran Llywodraeth Cymru. Mae'r gronfa ddata arloesol hon yn cynnwys dros 700,000 o enwau lleoedd a gasglwyd o ffynonellau hanesyddol, ac maent yn adnodd unigryw ar gyfer astudio defnydd tir, archaeoleg a hanes ac ar gyfer enwi strydoedd, ystadau a datblygiadau newydd (enwaulleoedddhanesyddol.cbhc.gov.uk/)

Mae'r Comisiwn yn chwarae rôl bwysig yn y gwaith o hyrwyddo treftadaeth drwy gyfrwng cyhoeddiadau, arddangosfeydd ac archaeoleg gymunedol.
